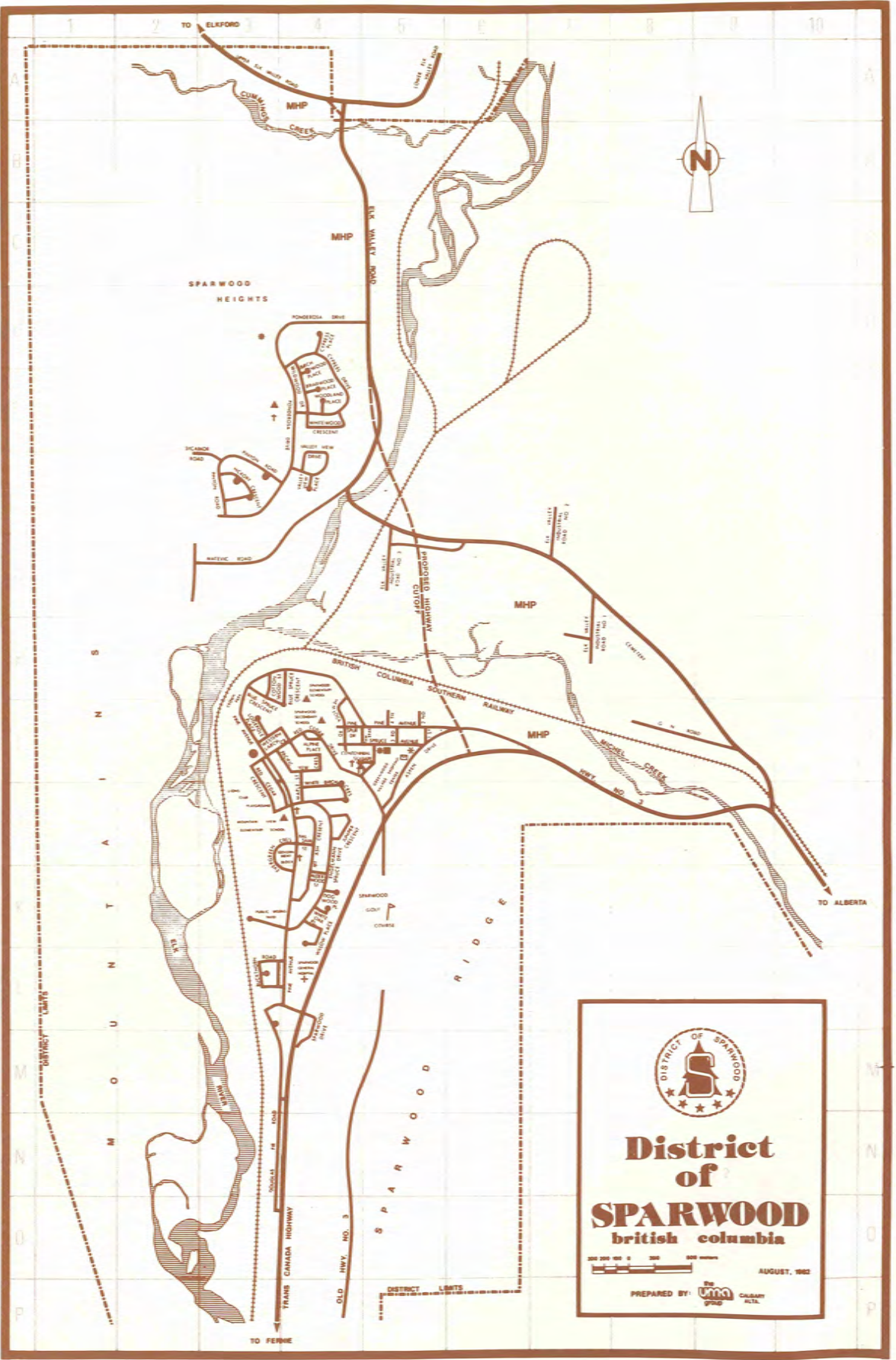

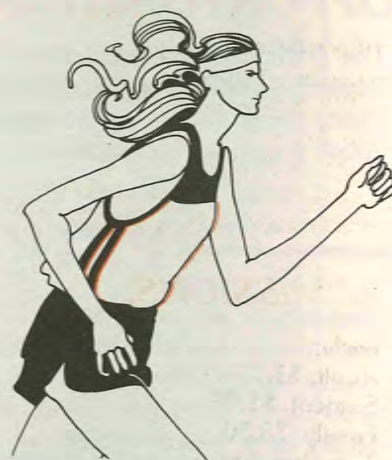

Fun for the whole family

There will be something for everyone in the new Leisure Centre in Sparwood this fall.

The design includes a variety of recreational facilities and it will accommodate many different kinds of groups and activities.

A pool, slides, sauna, whirlpool, solarium and racquetball courts are just some of the features. The pool is an oblong shape and it will accommodate both those people who want to splash around and those who are interested in swimming lengths.

"Image is important. The oblong shape is pleasurable to the eye. There will be tropical plants and warm soothing colors all over," Gary Tamblyn, leisure centre co-ordinator, says.

Slightly above the main pool is a small swimming area designed for young children who are learning to swim. The water in the 'tots' pool is shallow, suitable for adjustment to water courses. Water from the little pool will spill over into the large pool in a waterfall effect.

At one end of the main pool there will be another waterfall. Tropical plants will be placed around the area, creating a natural and relaxing environment. The sauna will be off to one side, connected to the change rooms.

A variety of courses will be offered at the new centre. Plans are being drawn up for red cross

lessons, but courses will also be offered for those people who are not strong swimmers. Mr. Tamblyn also hope the centre will offer some fun activities such as water-polo.

For those not aquatically inclined there are two racquetball courts, which will be open 24 hours a day on a token system. Players will purchase a token that will unlock the door and turn on lights for 45 minutes, eliminating the need for extra staff after hours.

Some equipment will be available through the centre such as kickboards and inner tubes and it is likely that other sports equipment will be available from a pro shop. A fitness and/or weight-lifting room can also be used regu-

larly. There will be lounges in the complex where potential people can mentally prepare themselves for their workouts, or simply relax with friends.

There is ample space in the changing rooms and several other features. "There will be a family changing area and also a separate area for the handicapped. A changing room, showers and lockers," Mr. Tamblyn says.

When the centre is completed this fall, there will be an official opening, followed by a "free swim" period.

A brochure listing the courses and programs offered in the leisure centre will be available late this year.

Rotary fountain salutes miners of past and present

A tribute to Elk Valley Miners will be established in Centennial Square in the spring of 1984.

The Sparwood Rotary Club is constructing a fountain at the centre of the square. But it will be more than a fountain, it will be a monument where residents can gather.

"We wanted to do a project that would pay tribute to mines, something special for the area," Don Nielsen, chairman of the Rotary fountain committee, said.

At the centre of the monument there will be chromed underground mining monitor, the high-pressure water gun world famous for its cutting ability.

"The monitor will shoot a stream of water into the archway. "It will be black in the archway to simulate an underground mine," Mr. Nielsen said.

Designs to match the theme will be sandblasted into the concrete around the area.

Work on the fountain began in the fall of 1983, but the cold weather has postponed the opening ceremony until the spring. The concrete structure is in place and most of the landscaping and paving stones will be in before the snow falls.

A railing will rim the outside of the monument, around which 4,000 square feet of interlocking paving stones will be set.

Steps will lead from the street down to the fountain level.

If funds are available, benches will be fit into the structure to encourage people to relax by the fountain.

At the centre of the area, two separate streams of water will

flow. On one side there will be a wall of water running 16 feet wide by 20 ft high. And, facing that, to the other side, the monitor will sit.

The concrete throughout the area will be sandblasted to a smooth finish. Designs of a pick and shovel, and a miner with a hat can already be seen in the foundation.

Organizers are hoping for a special lighting system to brighten up the area at night, but funds may run out before all the lighting is completed. Wiring for lighting behind the sheet of water and in the archway is already in place. "If there is enough funding left we would like to have lighting running around the perimeter."

Once the structure is completed, tests will have to be made to check out the water pressure and to see

that everything works as planned.

The fountain will cost \$140,000. Most of the money came from a B.C. lottery fund grant. That \$100,000 was put in the bank in 1980 while plans were being made for the final location of the fountain. A site had previously been chosen on Pine Ave.

The rest of the money for the project came from the Sparwood Rotary Club through various fund-raising events.

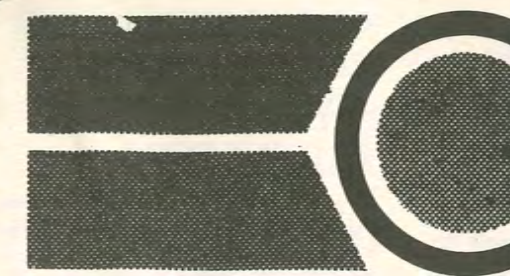
Westar Mining contributed the parts for the replica of the underground mining monitor.

Once completed, the fountain will be a special monument to both miners and Sparwood residents.

"We want it to be a place where people will feel comfortable gathering," Mr. Nielsen said.

Alpine club sought

It's all downhill for Kinsmen Ski Hill

The cutting and clearing work has been finished at the Kinsmen Ski Hill, located in Sparwood Heights, and all that's left is to finish building a lodge and install the ski lift.

Gary Walsh, Kinsmen ski hill committee chairman, said the T-bar-like tow will pull skiers up to the top of the 700-foot long hill and, once there, they have three choices: they can ski either of the two slopes or ski the network of cross-country trails.

The lodge consists of four trailers built together under a common roof. This is where cross-country and downhill skiers can spend the early evenings lounging on sofas in front of a fire with hot ciders purchased from a concession booth within the lodge.

The lodge requires the most work, as Kinsmen with all kinds of trades are involved in the preparation, Mr. Walsh said.

As a mainly beginner and intermediate hill, the 174-foot vertical drop on the nine- to 20-degree slope can still provide a challenge, he said. The hill was hand-picked by a consultant from Banff. The hill is in a good location for snow during the winter, so the manager to be hired for the ski area will have his work cut out for him packing snow.

Financed by a federal government NEED program grant of \$22,425, a \$71,000 commitment from the District of Sparwood and

a \$71,000 B.C. Lottery Fund grant, the hill, with the Kinsmen's own labor and equipment time contributions, will have cost about a quarter of a million dollars by the time it is finished this fall, Mr. Walsh said.

To get to the hill, skiers can drive through Sparwood Heights to the new mobile home park, where a road has been built by the district to the ski area parking lot.

Mr. Walsh wants to help organize a ski club for the hill. The Kinsmen have done their work and the hill will remain an ongoing project of great interest to the Sparwood service club, but a ski club will administer the day-to-day operation of the hill. The manager, who will be hired by the Kinsmen, will run the tow, packing equipment and generally keep an eye on things. People interested in forming an Alpine Club can call Mr. Walsh directly or refer to the directory listing under clubs and organizations in this booklet.

The Sparwood cross-country club is excited about the approximately three kilometres of winding, sloping trails north of the hill. The trails connect to the bottom and top of the ski hill. The trail system, which will be expanded later, is a figure eight design and is wide enough to accommodate many skiers.

Len DeRoche, cross-country

club president, expects participation to sharply increase in the active club because of the new home.

Huffing and puffing to get fit in Lions Park

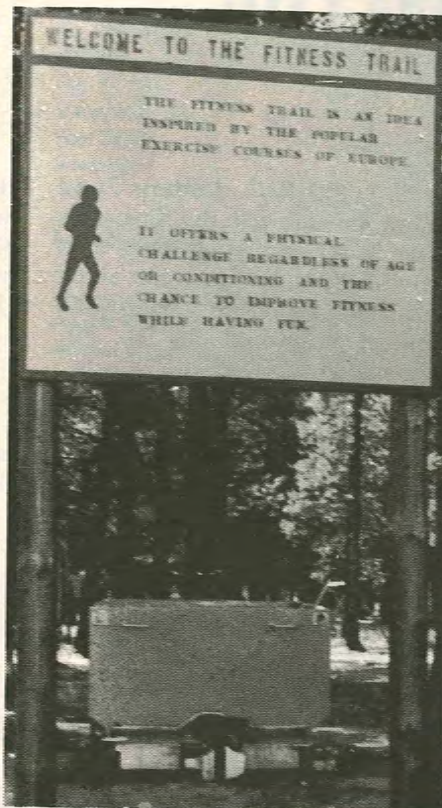
Hidden away from a main street, under some trees, is a haven for fitness enthusiasts.

Lions Park, beside Mountain View Elementary School, is now complete with a fitness trail, ball park, and playground. The District of Sparwood turned the land over to the Lions club several years ago, but only in the last six months has the fitness park taken shape.

The project nears completion this fall, with a dedication ceremony planned for later this year.

The central focus of the park is the fitness trail, which winds for about one kilometer through the woods. Spotted along the trail are pieces of equipment where a jogger can stop and do some sport exercises.

There is a sign posted by the piece of equipment explaining how to use it. Sit ups, chin ups, balancing, and stretching are just a few of the exercises listed. The instructions on the signs are simple and the exercises flexible enough that people of all ages can

do them.

The props along the jogging trail are painted in bright blues, yellows and reds. A few colorful picnic tables are also scattered throughout the park.

Organizers feel they have received some positive feedback from Sparwood citizens. It is also well used by students at Mountain View School. Gym teachers often take their classes through the fitness trail.

At the entrance to the park there is a playground for children. There are swings, slides, a big tire, and other pieces of equipment to play on. The equipment is not all piled together -- but it is spread out among the trees, and the ground around it is covered with wood chips and grass. With no cement foundations it makes for a much softer landing for rough and tumble kids.

Although the fitness trail presents no big challenge for serious athletes, it does make for a fun workout, outdoors, and away from a main street.
