





Remember priorities

Council must be finding itself on the horns of a dilemna over the proposed community hall.

If one recalls the agonizing days when the restraint policy of the provincial government descended upon the Leisure Centre, some things had to be eliminated from the original plan.

Those items included a competition-size swimming pool and a new library. When these cuts were made the council at the time promised they would be placed on the priority list for future planning.

By public usage of the Leisure Centre as we see it today, restating the pool as a priority should be made again. The same priority should be given to the library which is now housed in extremely cramped quarters and its usage by the public rapidly increasing.

There is no doubt that the community centre is needed, and there is talk about including a library in the facility, but talk in that direction should be focussed on location before thoughts of inclusion can be considered.

The two can go together, but instead of focussing its attention on the community centre, council should abide by its earlier set of priorities.

BOOK NOOK FROM THE SPARWOOD PUBLIC LIBRARY By Jim Bertoia, Librarian

The Sparwood Public Library has just received a new shipment of foreign language books. We currently have assorted titles of fiction, non-fiction, and children's books in German, Italian, Chinese, Polish, Hindi, Punjabi, Urdu and Vietnamese.

We receive these foreign books quarterly from Library Services Branch in Cranbrook. This current batch will be with us until June of this year.

The foreign language book service is a joint venture by Library Services in Victoria and the National Library in Ottawa.

The service is well used in Sparwood, especially the Punjabi, Hindi, Italian and German books. Other languages are available if desired, such as Welsh, Gaelic, Spanish, Russian, and any other major language.

One language that can not be obtained through this service is French. As Canada is a bilingual nation, French is not considered foreign. We are trying to obtain French books on a similar basis from Victoria at present.

In addition to the foreign books loans service, the Victoria office has a great deal of foreign titles in stock - we can request any title in a foreign language direct from Victoria.

We also have a local source for Punjabi and Hindi books. The Elkford Public Library has a large collection of books in Punjabi and Hindi, and we are able to obtain any of their titles that a patron may want. We have a catalog of their books for any interested borrower.

The Sparwood Public Library is very pleased to be able to offer this service to borrowers who have difficulty in reading English. The enjoyment of literature need not be denied to immigrants or visitors to Canada.

We have just received a small shipment of twelve new books for adults. Two prolific and popular authors have new books out this season: Mary Stewart is back with A Wicked Day. Set in Arthurian

England, it deals with King Arthur's illegitimate son's plot to take over the throne.

The Time of the Hunter's Moon is Victoria Holt's 22nd novel. A romantic mystery set in England, full of love and intrigue which will keep her many fans happy until novel number 23.

The Return of Martin Guerre by Natalie Zemon Davis is a curious book. It is the true story of a man in France who deserted his wife, only to return years later to find an imposter in his place at home. Who was the imposter? Which man was the real Martin Guerre? Intriguing reading, this book is nonfiction, yet reads like a novel, and is currently a play on Broadway

Science Fiction fans have reason to rejoice: Three new books by old pros. Piers Anthony is starting a new series called Incarnations of Immortality, of which On a Pale Horse is the first volume.

Brian Aldiss continues his Helliconia series with Helliconia Summer, about an interplanetary summer that lasts for centuries.

Worlds Apart by Joe Haldeman is the second volume of his Worlds trilogy. A novel full of thermonuclear war, interplanetary battles, and murder.

In non-fiction, we have Stanley Karnow's Vietnam: a history. Considered to be the authoritative book on the conflict on southeast Asia. A massive book of almost 800 pages.

Debrett's Guide to the Canadian Establishment by Peter C. Newman is a large sized illustrated book about the movers and shakers of Canadian business. Families such as the Birks, Bronfmans, Eatons, Vaniers, Woodwards. A sort of illustrated Who's Who of Canadian society.

For modern musical tastes we have a book called The Rolling Stones, published by the magazine, Rolling Stone. It is an illustrated story of the life and lyrics of Mick Jagger and the boys.



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

Fire Chief Don Wilson warns of hazards children face

During the five year period ending in 1981 over 900 children under 15 years of age died in accidents as the result of fires in Canada, tragic losses indeed. Many of these deaths occured as the result of carelessness, lack of supervision or simply lack of knowledge: most of these deaths could have been averted.

In the United States, of the in excess of 8,500 people who die annually in fire, from injuries related to fires, and accidents causing burns, the majority of the victims are children.

More children die because of accidents than to all the childhood communicable diseases combined.

Over the next couple of weeks, we will talk about the various ways in which a child can be badly burnt, and the ways in which we as parents can prevent these accidents from happening.

Recent studies have demonstrated that a serious cause of burns in

type of injury happens every day somewhere in Canada.

In spite of cosmetic surgery, badly burnt children carry the scars through adulthood . . . scars that remind parents and guardians that the accident could have been prevented.

Make it your priority to deal with the reduction, control and elimination of the factors that contribute to high risk situations and associated fires and burns.

Learn now what you can do to prevent burns. Hot Liquids

The greatest single cause of burns is hot liquid. Such burns occur most frequently in the kitchen and bathroom and the most commonly injured person is a child. Toddlers and preschool children are most frequently the victims of scald burns with a large number of these burns resulting from a lack of supervision.

A pot or pan on the stove is a temptation to a child. They may reach up and pull the

the pan of cooking food on themselves. Always make sure that all pot and pan handles are turned inwards on the stove, away from the reach of children.

Eighty per cent of burns received by children two years of age and under are the result of coffee or tea being spilled from the hands of parents. Never hold a child while drinking hot liquids.

A tablecloth hanging over the side of a table can result in burns or scalds. A child's temptation may lead him to grab it, pulling along with it a pot of steaming tea or some other hot liquid or food. When young children are present, tablecloths or any other piece of furniture should never be used.

Many hot tap water scalds, in both children and adults, occur as a result of exposure to hot water. Various authorities recommend that the water temperature at the bathtub faucet or shower head should be a maximum of 120 degrees F (48.9 dechildren feel comfortable when the water temperature is 100 degrees F (38 degrees C).

Anytime a young child is being given a bath, there must be an adult or competent older child in constant attendance. Prior to placing the child in the bath, the water should be tested to insure that it is an acceptable comfortable temperature.

Leaving a child alone for only a short period can result in a scald. The child may play with the faucets and allow excess hot water to enter the tub and be severely burned in the process. This situation constitutes the cause of many of the hot tap water burns.

Parents, babysitters, or anyone responsible for the care of a child should remove the child from the tub whenever they must leave the room to answer the phone, see who is at the door or attend to any other business. This simple action of moving the child from the hazard will prevent extremely serious burns and may prevent the death of the child.

Why take the chance? Keep the children away from the hot water and prevent a ser-

ious burn. Instruct older children in the safe use of showers and hot water and be sure no young child is ever left unattended in the bathtub. Next week we will discuss electrical hazards and matches.

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
