Revitalization moves bit closer

It was a productive meeting for the Downtown Revitalization Committee. All twelve merchants voted "yes" for the project.

Now all the merchants have to get is the signature of the land owners who must pay back a low interest loan to the tune of \$95 each month. Organizers admit there is still some selling to do, but are convinced that the merchants and owners will be willing to spend the money to improve.

The money will bring a new look to downtown Sparwood. Brick store fronts, extension of the sidewalks, eight foot

Urgent meeting

A special "constitutional" meeting of the Sparwood Public Library Association has been

called for Wednesday, March 13 at 7 p.m. at the Library. Board chairman David Paine said the general meeting was necessary as the constitution must be ammended to lower the number of trustees required for a regular meeting. canopies over the businesses, planters, benches, trees, and paving stones are just some of the benefits the downtown will receive. That is, if one hundred per cent of the merchants vote for the spending.

According to organizers, Murry Lott and Tilio Porco, other towns which improve an aging business centre discover a rise in business from between 10 per cent and 15 per cent. Nelson and Chemainus are two of the towns which tried revitalization and discovered its rich rewards, said Brian Erickson of the District of

Sparwood.

"It seems contradictory that a town spend \$110,000 on a fountain to improve the looks of the town centre when the surrounding buildings are dilapitated," Erikson said.

The total cost of revitalization is \$355,000. The municipality agreed at Wednesday's meeting to pay \$158,400 of the total. This money would go toward projects such as parking lot improvements, lighting, and sidewalk improvements, Erikson said recently.

The merchants have 10

years in which to pay back the loan from the provincial government's coffers. They are contributing \$197,400 through a program sponsored by the Ministry of Municipal Affairs (MOMA) in Victoria. Two years of this money is interest free.

According to Mr. Erik-

son's calculations this is an outright gift of more than \$50,000 to Sparwood's merchants.



Police are investigating the theft of tools and gas from Rayco Steel in Sparwood.


The theft occured sometime during the night of March 5 and 6.

Restauranteur starts Kootenay secession move

man has started an organization which advocates the secession of the Kootenays from the rest of British Columbia.

Restaurant owner Michael Jessen said he is starting the secession group because of his frustration with recent provincial government restraint measures which are hurting the West Kootenay area and Nelson in particular.

Jessen said his organization is called ASK the Alliance for the Secession of the Koot-

"There are two reasons for the name,' Jessen said. "Our area has been asking, almost begging, the government to reverse cut-

Sparwood to plug away

Sparwood council, after five years of trying, is still "plugging away" at getting into the Residence Rehabilitation Assistance Program (RRAP).

Although Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation has said they were not prepared at this time to designate Sparwood as eligible for grants because of "very limited funding at this time," Romeo LeBlanc, the minister responsible for CMHC has told council, "I would encourage you to stay in touch with Mr. G. Fessenden, manager of CMHC's Cranbrook office, to be kept informed on the status of your request.'

backs to government services in this area for a number of months to no avail. By joining ASK, people will be able to say - I've had it with asking and to join ASK is to tell.'

The restaurant owner said the second reason for the organization's name is its use as an organizing tool

"I plan to give everyone who joins the group a button on which ASK is imprinted on a beautiful scene of mountains, trees and a lake,' Jessen said. "Anyone wearing this button will automatically generate conversation with whomever he or she meets because the button urges people to ask"

Jessen said government cutbacks in staffing at Forest Service, Human Resources, Fish and Wildlife, Highways, and Lands, Parks and **Housing Departments** is having a devastating effect on the area's economy.

"The announced closure of the David Thompson University Centre in Nelson was the last straw for me," Jessen said, adding that students, staff and faculty account for 20 per cent of his restaurant's business.

"Business was already down 11 per cent in 1983," Jessen said, the first yearly decline in sales since his restaurant began operation in

"People are frustrated because of lack of jobs in the Kootenay area and they are moving in droves," he said. "There are 500 homes for sale in the Nelson area alone."

The tone of his secession organization is humourous, Jessen said.

"I hope a humourous approach will garner some media attention to the seriousness of our situation," Jessen said. "Our slogan is 'If we use a little humour, maybe we can laught them out of office'.

A 37-year-old native of Denmark who became a Canadian citizen in 1967, Jessen said he has been told the tone of his organization is akin to the way the Danish people reacted to the invasion of the German army during World War

"People have told me the Danes just laughed at the Germans for their action," Jessen said. "I think a similar kind of ridicule is called for in response to the Social Credit government's actions in the Kootenays.'

The restaurant owner said one of the first actions of ASK will put Premier Bill Bennett in the unemployment line.

Because we do not have a warm weather, polluted lake to send our area's decadent bureaucrats for their holidays, we plan to include the entire riding of Okanagan South within the boundaries of our new state or province," Jessen said.

"Unfortunately this will put the premier out

MLA for Okanagan South," he added. "This will give him the opportunity to learn how almost 40 per cent of the people in the West Kootenay are living."

Jessen said the area within a 250-mile radius of Nelson generates more than 50 per cent of the electrical energy created in the province. Of that amount, he said the area uses less than half.

"We are an energy and resource bread basket for the Lower Mainland area and it is time people there realized it.

Jessen said the David Thompson University Centre requires threequarters of one per cent of the annual universities budget for the province.

"If, after all we contribute to the economy of this province, we can not even get threequarters of one per cent back for our university centre, then it is time we put a boundary around our resources and say to the provincial government that enough is enough.'

Using a line from the recently popular movie, Network, Jessen said the people of the Kootenays are "mad as hell and aren't going to take it anymore.

Jessen said he hopes thousands of Kootenay residents will pay a \$2

fee to join ASK.

He said money contributed will be used to pay for the buttons and mailing of the ASK message to all area councils and provincial MLAs and MPs.

"I hope village, town and city councils in the Kootenays will agree to unite behind this single message of anger," Jessen said. "we need to tell the government that someone is willing

to say no to their actions."

In order to generate extra interest in his idea for an independent Kootenay province, Jessen said a contest is being held to name the new

"The winner will receive a free dinner for two at my restaurant," Jessen concluded.

With co-operation from the weather, some 60 smowmobilers rode the planned 100 km route to once again collect money for crippled children.



Crippled Children.



"Recently," said Lockstead, "there was nearly a nasty incident, when a constituent after repeated calls to a busy number - fortunately managed from desperation to circumvent the system.

'Does the minister regard this as an acceptable standard of ambulance service or is he waiting for serious medical problems or possible death before taking remedial action?" asked Lockstead.
